Starting in the fourth grade, children begin the process of building on the 🔌 basics that they have learned in the primary grades. In math, they will expand on % their basic knowledge and will begin to apply the concepts at a higher level. For % language arts, they will write more complex pieces and will work to refine the % mechanics of writing. There will be more reading in the subject areas of history and % science. The pace will pick up: the children will be expected to be more independent and *responsible* for their learning. They will receive grades in math, **Science, and social studies**. The focus of homework will be on responsibility 🔍 and independence, as well as reinforcement, practice, and challenge.

Curriculum Overview

More details about the curriculum are as follows:

🍆 Language Arts:

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- Spelling Pretests on are Mondays and tests are on Fridays. Individualized lists are formed from student writing. Challenge words are available every week. Students must study their lists at home for Friday's test. No written spelling homework will be assigned. See the eBoard for study activities.
- **Reading**-Journeys published by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt. Journeys is our core reading program designed to meet the diverse needs of all students. It includes whole group reading and leveled readers to facilitate the development of the students' comprehension, critical thinking skills, vocabulary, and fluency. During the winter, we read about and study Harriet Tubman and in the spring we will read Charlotte's Web. Students will also read magazines (TFK and National Geographic for Kids) and have selfselected reading time.

- Writing- <u>Being a Writer</u> program, which combines the use of mentor texts and self-selected writing including narrative, persuasive, expository, descriptive, and poetry writing: English grammar, mechanics of writing, spelling instruction, and vocabulary development
- Speaking- Formal (student presentations of projects and reports): Informal (daily opportunities to share in class)
- Standardized Tests DRP (reading comprehension- fall and spring): DIBELS (reading fluency - fall, winter, spring): PSSA (spring)

Mathematics: Mathematics

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- Mathematics <u>Investigations</u> by Scott Foresman
- Subject Matter Statistics & Data Analysis, Number Systems, Whole Number Computation & Estimation, Geometry, Fractions & Decimals, Probability, Measurement
- Math Goals for Students Knowledge of basic facts (this is very important!), problem solving skills, communication of math ideas both verbally and in written form, applying mathematics in everyday situations, using appropriate computational skills
- Assessments Teacher observations, class participation, homework completion, quizzes, tests
- Standardized Tests PSSA (spring), ERB (spring), CBA (spring)

Science:

- Subject Matter: Ecosystems
- **Program overview:** STC is an inquiry-based science program for grades K-8 developed by the National Academies and the Smithsonian Institute. Students will participate in engaging, hands-on science experiences provided through evidence-based science curriculum. The big idea that students learn through this unit is that "organisms are linked to each other and to their environments in a web of relationships."

Concepts - Interactions within and among living systems cause changes in matter and energy. Organisms are linked to each other and to their environments in a web of relationships.

- Experiments Students will create "Ecocolumns".
- Assessments homework completion, class work, group work, quizzes

- The fourth grade has 46 laptops to share. They are used in all areas of the curriculum and are at our disposal almost every day.
- There are district-wide programs that monitor the students' progress in certain areas. These programs are "First in Math" a program based on the game "24", "Type to Learn", a typing program, and "Study Island", a reading/writing program which targets skills covered on the PSSA.

Social Skills & Conflict Resolution

• All grade levels at Gladwyne use "Second Step", a program designed to help the children think about, develop, and practice positive social skills.

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• Students will also be participating in the "No Place For Hate" program. "This program was created by the Anti-Defamation League and "empowers children to challenge anti-Semitism, racism, and other forms of bigotry."

Homework & Book Reports

- The focus of homework in the 4th grade is INDEPENDENCE in and RESPONSIBILITY in Sometimes homework might seem "too easy". This is because the objective of the homework assignment is for the child to feel what it is like to be <u>100% independent</u>, while reinforcing and practicing something learned in school.
- I encourage the children to try to be in charge of "setting themselves up" for doing their homework, to try the work on their own, and to seek out help only if needed.
- Homework is assigned on Mondays and is due on Fridays, unless otherwise specified.
- There will typically be an "extra credit" page included with each week's homework: this is an enrichment activity for students to try.
- This year there will be six book reports. The children will select 3 activities from a choice of 30 for each report. Please see the book report schedule for due dates and genre requirements.

Other Important Information

 All major tests and assignments should be signed. Please promptly sign and return, as these items will be place in your child's portfolio.
